





Walton County Public Works has removed approximately 2,216 tons of debris related to the wide spread devastation due to a major storm on Tuesday, January 9, 2024.





Dirt to pave projects are a multi-faceted process. Our specialty crews has completed the second phase of Indian Creek Ranch Road.


Specialty crews are working on the shoulders prepping for sod. Road shoulders serve many vital functions. It provides lateral support to the pavement structure and allows for improved drainage away from the pavement.

- **litter removal, and any other problem in the right-of-way**
